WELCOME

A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols was first held at King's College at the University of Cambridge, England on Christmas Eve 1918. It was planned by The Rev. Eric Milner-White who was appointed Dean of the Chapel in 1912 and served as a World War I army chaplain from 1914 until 1918.

The service, adapted from an order drawn up by Bishop Edward White Benson for use on Christmas Eve in 1880 at Truro Cathedral in Cornwall, England, tells "the loving purposes of God" from the fall of humanity, to the promise of the Messiah, and the birth of Jesus Christ through nine Bible lessons interspersed with the singing of Christmas carols and choral anthems.

The service was first broadcast by the BBC in 1928 and has been broadcast annually, even during World War II when the 16th-century stained glass had been removed from the Chapel.
