FROM YOUR SENIOR MINISTER

"Is your life focused on thick or thin places?"

Have you noticed that the news seems to focus on "thick places"—those places where our world is farthest from God? For some strange reason, we gravitate to the stories of murder, corruption, abuse, crime, and war. We often live in "thick places" where fears and assumptions make us deaf to God's voice breaking through the heavens. But God gives us moments when He comes near, moments when we sense the fragrance of His presence, and we hear the whisper of His voice.

Celtic Christianity has a term to refer to those moments when the separation between this world and heaven becomes so minimal that we sense the presence of God. They call these moments "thin places." They are the places where love and compassion reign. Where forgiveness overcomes resentment. Where selfishness is swallowed up in sacrifice. Where prejudice surrenders to acceptance. Where the violent flame is quenched, and people live in peace. They are the times when our soul is overwhelmed with awe, and we worship God.

For some of us, "heaven meets earth" in nature – on the oceans or in the mountains. For others, "heaven meets the earth" through music, relationships, worship and spiritual disciplines, art, and life moments. Any of these spaces can create the conditions for those "thin places" or epiphanies, which allow us to be touched and transformed in profound ways by God.

On my second visit to the Holy Land, I experienced my "thin place." It was in the intimate setting of the Gabbatha, deep beneath the Convent of the Sisters of Zion in Old Town Jerusalem. When the convent was being constructed in the 1860s, archaeologists unearthed a stretch of stone payment that many believe is the location of the "Judgement Seat" where Pontius Pilate tried and condemned Jesus to death by crucifixion and where the Roman guards cast lots for His garments. See John 19:13.

At one end of the pavement is a mosaic of the Lord Jesus carrying His cross along those very stones. In that quiet place, deep beneath the bustling city of Jerusalem, I was so moved that I wanted to fall on my knees in His presence. It was truly my "thin place" where I felt that heaven and earth met – touching me in a way that transformed my witness in the world.

When Jesus came, the reign of God broke through upon the Earth so that we were able to see, in a brilliant flash, what God's Kingdom really looks like. Wherever Jesus went, He created a thin place. This is why Jesus said, "the Kingdom of God is at hand."

When He sent his followers out, Jesus taught them to live and speak in such a way that people would know that they had come into a "thin place." "Whatever city you enter and they receive you, eat what is set before you; and heal those in it who are sick, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you'" (Luke 10:8).

As followers of Jesus, our task is to help create the "thin places." We do so by living in such a way that the reign of God rules in our hearts, controlling our speech, our actions, and our decisions. We are to create "thin places" wherever we work or study, among our co-workers, fellow students, family, friends, and even our enemies.





AN UPDATE FROM OUR CHURCH COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON

I would like to provide an update on the issue of our affiliation with the United Methodist Church. On March 30, a lawsuit was filed by 186 churches, including LaGrange First Methodist, seeking to restore the provisions outlined in *The Book of Discipline* that would allow our congregation to determine the future of our church through a church-wide vote.

Please be reminded of the steps that we have taken to date:

December 2022

On December 13, our Church Council voted to request a Church Conference to be called by our District Superintendent, The Rev. Susan Landry, to determine if we remain under the umbrella of the United Methodist

Church or choose to affiliate with a different Methodist denomination. The Council believes that this issue is of such importance that every church member's voice should be heard through a formal vote. A written request was forwarded to Rev. Landry.

On December 28, Bishop Sue Haupert-Johnson and her Cabinet announced via email a "pause" on all disaffiliations in the North Georgia Conference until the UMC General Conference meets in May 2024. This blockage prevents our church from potentially exercising the provisions of Paragraph 2553 of *The Book of Discipline* which allows churches to disaffiliate and retain their church property if the process is completed and ratified by the Annual Conference prior to December 31,

2023, which is five months before the UMC General Conference session.

January 2023

On January 8, 2023, The Rev. Dr. Robin Dease was installed as the new Bishop of the North Georgia Conference. Dr. John Jackson, Co-Lay Leader, and I sent a letter to Bishop Dease on January 10 to welcome her to the Conference and to request a meeting to discuss her position and paths forward for our church. On January 30, I received an email from our District Superintendent that the Bishop would not discuss the affiliation issue with local churches.

I convened meetings with our Executive Leadership Committee to review options and a path forward.

This Committee is comprised of Church Council Chairperson (Nancy Stevens), Board of Trustees Chairperson (Lea Rawlinson), Finance Chairperson (Rhonda Mitchell), Staff-Parish Relations Chairperson (Jan Mallory), Lay Leaders (John Jackson and Martha Pirkle), Lay Member of Annual Conference (Jennifer Emery), Memorial Foundation President (Esther Rainey), and Vision 2028 Chairperson (Libba Bowling).

February 2023

On February 9, John Jackson presented a recommendation on behalf of the Committee for the Church Council to authorize our Board of Trustees to join other North Georgia Conference United Methodist churches in retaining the counsel of the National Center of Life and Liberty (NCLL). This nonprofit legal firm will seek to restore our rights to exercise the provisions outlined in The Book of Discipline. The recommendation was approved by a vote of 15 in favor and 1 opposed.

Our church joined NCLL and signed a retainer agreement with the firm. All costs associated with our representation (not to exceed \$3500) have been covered through private donations; no church budget funds are being used.

March 2023

Throughout the months of February and March, Attorney David Gibbs of NCLL participated in discussions with Harold Buckley, Chancellor of the North Georgia Conference. A formal settlement agreement was sent to the Conference for their consideration. Our preference has always been to settle this matter amicably. However, time is of the essence since the provisions of Paragraph 2553 of The Book of Discipline expire at the end of this year, and the Conference continues to delay responding to the requests of our legal counsel. Therefore, we joined 185 churches, including 22 of the largest 100 churches in the Conference, in filing the lawsuit on March 30. The lawsuit requests that the pause be lifted so churches may proceed with congregational votes on the issue of our affiliation.

This Easter

As resurrection people, we see the great meaning of Easter. This is no casual celebration, for we know that it came at great cost. When we experience the events of Holy Week, we see the agony and the suffering, the anguish of the garden of Gethsemane, the torture and pain Jesus endured, and His awful death on the cross of Calvary. Understanding the darkness Jesus faced makes the light of this Easter triumph even more glorious. The atrocity of the cruel cross is overcome by the victory of the empty tomb. And for you and me, it is what gives greater depth and meaning to our celebration as a follower of Christ.

So, my friends, I ask you to place your absolute truth in God to show us our way forward. Each Sunday when we gather for worship, we commemorate Christ being raised from the dead. Because the victory of Jesus over the grave has such great implications for the living of our faith, we can truly proclaim in the words of a great hymn, "Every day to us is Easter with its resurrection song!"

May we remain in prayer for one another, for our ministers and staff, and for our mission to Make and Grow Disciples of Jesus Christ for the Transformation of the World!
