

A Message from Dr. John ...

'I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day!'

On Christmas day in 1863, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was inspired to write the poem we now know as the Christmas carol, "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day." It was a testament to the resilience of faith in the human spirit.

The New England Historical Society reports that Longfellow had fallen into a depression in 1861 when his second wife Frances died. She had been sealing envelopes with hot wax when a flame caught her clothes on fire. Henry had rushed to her aid and tried to smother the flames. But by the time the fire was out, Frances had been burned beyond recovery. She died the next day. Henry, burned badly as well, was too sick to attend her funeral.

The death marked a turning point in Longfellow's life. His physical appearance changed dramatically as he began growing his beard because the burns disfigured his face. Mentally, he sank into depression. On Christmas day in 1862 he would record in his journal: "A merry Christmas' say the children, but that is no more for me."

The poet was a staunch abolitionist, but he, like the entire country, was troubled by the Civil War. His son Charley in March of 1863 had decided that, regardless of his father's wishes, he would join the fight. He ran off to Washington to enlist in the 1st Massachusetts Artillery. In November, Charley's unit was engaged in a battle, and he was shot. The bullet went through him from back to shoulder, just nicking his spine. Back at their Cambridge home on December 8, and a grim Longfellow set about the months-long process of trying to nurse his son back to health.

The circumstances challenged Longfellow's resolve, but he was inspired when he heard the church bells ringing. He found in them a message that peace would come again to the troubled nation. They inspired him to write the poem, "Christmas Bells."

I heard the bells on Christmas Day, their old, familiar carols play, And wild and sweet the words repeat of peace on earth, good-will to men!

And thought how, as the day had come, the belfries of all Christendom Had rolled along the unbroken song of peace on earth, good-will to men!

Till, ringing, singing on its way, the world revolved from night to day, A voice, a chime, a chant sublime of peace on earth, good-will to men!

Then from each black, accursed mouth the cannon thundered in the South, And with the sound the carols drowned of peace on earth, good-will to men!

It was as if an earthquake rent the hearth-stones of a continent, And made forlorn the households born of peace on earth, good-will to men!

And in despair I bowed my head; "There is no peace on earth," I said: "For hate is strong, and mocks the song of peace on earth, good-will to men!"

While, for us, the year 2020 did not include a civil war, we were shaken by unresolved civil strife, a global pandemic, and a bruising presidential election. Many in our congregation lost a spouse and even children to death. The Colonial patriot, Thomas Paine, was right: "These are the times that try men's souls." Yet, I choose to exercise the faith of Longfellow and lean into 2021 with resolute trust in the providential goodness of God:

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: "God is not dead; nor doth He sleep! The Wrong shall fail the Right prevail, with peace on earth, good-will to men!"

Remember how much I love you ... It is an honor to be your Senior Minister!

New 'Soul Connection' weekly small groups to meet during Lent

Through the last nine months of not being able to visit as we normally would with friends, family, loved ones, and our church family, one thing has become abundantly clear to me: We Are Better Together! We were created to be in relationship with one another and with God, and we are not meant to go through life alone. As we begin 2021, we at First United Methodist are making it a priority to embrace and live into these truths churchwide.

Beginning Sunday, January 24, you will have the opportunity to sign up to be a part of new Soul Connection Groups at First Methodist. Groups will meet weekly throughout the course of Lent (February 21-March 28) and are open to all for participation. These small groups consisting of no more than a dozen individuals are designed to allow participants to do life together, further connecting with God and one another in transformational community. Modeled after early Methodist Class Meetings, these groups will revolve around two primary "check-in" questions that were employed by the founder of Methodism, John Wesley:

- 1) "How is it with your soul?"
- 2) "How did you experience God this week?"

Utilizing these two questions, Wesley gave people who had experiences of God in worship, the opportunity to dive deeper

into their faith and prioritize their daily walk with Christ within the context of small group discipleship.

Soul Connection Groups will prioritize transformation over information. While learning information about the Bible and theology are important aspects of our faith, this group is not intended to be a curriculum-driven Bible study class (although groups will discuss Scripture together), but a relationship-driven connection group.

In this season of working on New Year's resolutions, perhaps, like me, your soul yearns for deeper connections with God and others in the year ahead? If that's the case, let me invite you to do two things. First, be sure to tune into our Sermon Series for January in which we will examine the fact that we are "Better Together." Second, be on the lookout for more information about Soul Connection Groups and registration opportunities. I cannot wait to see the ways that God uses this new discipleship opportunity to help us grow in the grace of God together at First United Methodist Church in 2021!

MISSION OF THE MONTH:

Homeless Coalition Warming Center

The LaGrange-Troup County Homeless Coalition Warming Center is our church's mission focus for January. As this is the coldest month of the year, we need your help to meet the immediate needs of those facing homelessness in our community. We ask for your support in two primary ways:

- 1) The Warming Center is always in need of volunteers to help staff the center and to be a supportive presence for guests. Sometimes the ministry of presence can make all the difference in another person's life. If you would be interested in volunteering, please contact Pastor Ben at ben@lagrangefumc.org.
- 2) We have set a goal to raise \$3,000 over the next month in support of those who utilize the Homeless Coalition Warming Center. For \$25, you can provide a Care Kit of material goods such as gloves, socks, and toiletries, two meals, a towel, and a sleeping bag to someone in need. With \$3,000 raised, we can ensure that 75 individuals have a softer place to lay their head, food in their stomach, and essentials to maintain healthy hygiene. You can give toward our efforts by making out a check payable to First United Methodist Church with "missions" in the memo line and sending it to the church, or by giving online toward "missions" for the remainder of January. All gifts we receive toward missions until January 31 will be used in support of this project until our goal is met. Any additional funds given in January that exceed our goal will remain in the missions fund for future projects to show the love of God in our community.
